

Pillars of our Church

his week has a major liturgical celebration: the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul. These two apostles are strong pillars of our Catholic faith and assure the historicity and direct link of our faith to the founder Jesus Christ. In this solemnity, we affirm:

First, that we serve a God who delivers his children from unjust oppression as he delivered Peter from the hand of Herod. (Acts 12:1-11). The Liturgy of the Word (second part)

fter the reading of the Gospel, the priest or the deacon gives the homily. According to the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium, 52), the homily is to be highly esteemed as part of the liturgy itself; in fact, at those Masses which are celebrated with the assistance of the people on Sundays and feasts of obligation, it should not be omitted except for a serious reason. In general, a homily is an explanation of the readings. It can also be an explanation of any other liturgical text like the collect, the prayer over the offerings, the preface, the prayer after Communion, etc.

In light of the above, the homily should not be substituted with a meeting during which the celebrant invites the faithful to fund some Parish projects. The homily cannot be considered as an exercise of fraternal correction or a message addressed to a particular person in the assembly. Such deviations must be avoided.

It is important to know that the homily must be given by a priest or a deacon, but never by a layperson. It is important to clarify this liturgical rule. Saying that the

homily cannot be given by a layperson does not mean that a lay person cannot intervene in some contexts. Sometimes it happens that the priest or the deacon cannot give the homily due to a language barrier. In this case, a well-prepared layperson like a catechist can share the word of God. In liturgy, the context must be taken into account in order to avoid some exaggerations.

After the homily, a moment of silence should be observed in order to give the faithful an opportunity to internalise the message that they have heard and to pray that the Lord may give them the grace to put into practice what they have heard. That moment of silence is also meant to let the Holy Spirit continue teaching the faithful since the celebrant cannot exhaust God's Word.

After the moment of silence, it is time for the profession of Faith or Creed. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the purpose of the Creed is that the congregation may respond to the Word of God as proclaimed. The congregation also honors and confess the great mysteries of faith by pronouncing the rule of faith in a formula approved for liturgical use and before the

celebration of these mysteries in the Eucharist begins. There are two formulas that can be used: The Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed which is longer and the Apostles' Creed which is shorter.

After the profession of faith, there is the Universal Prayer or the Prayer of the Faithful. The assembly responds to the Word of God and offer prayers to God. Petitions are offered for the needs of the Church, for the public authorities, for the burdened by any kind of difficulty and for the local community. The celebrant begins the Prayer of the Faithful with an introduction and concludes it with prayer.

Commitment in Mission

This Sunday's Word has two essential themes: The encouragement of the Apostles by Jesus and the promise of the victory of life over death given by Christ. In the Gospel, Jesus sends the twelve apostles on a mission to Galilee. Jesus gives them directions for their mission and warns them of the dangers they will encounter. This would probably have led the disciples to be afraid as the mission was presented as high-risk. Today, this still happens to missionaries. They encounter rejection and jealousy. As an assurance, Jesus encourages them, "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul." (Mt 26). He exhorts them to proclaim the Word of God without fear. Jesus says: "Whoever recognizes me before men, I will recognize him before my Father in heaven. But if anyone denies me before men, I will also deny him before my Father in Heaven." (Mt 10:32-33). Prophet Jeremiah lived this reality in the sixth century before Christ. Like all prophets, he was rejected by the people of God. He was mocked for speaking out against their consciences, while remaining faithful to the mission he had received from God. However, God was with him, he assured him that his enemies would fall. Like Jeremiah we must stand firm in our mission as messengers of God's truth. By our baptism we



accept to denounce the evils and the vices of this world. We commit ourselves to speak the truth that liberates, is just and consequence is peaceful co existence. Unfortunately, because of the desire for power and materialistic things, we cling to evil. We turn away from Christ and his teachings that draw us to good and the redemption of our sins. Jesus Christ has brought the redemption that leads to eternal life. To live happily, the whole of humanity is called to accept the Good News of salvation announced by the messengers of God. Let us pray that the Lord will grant us his mercy. "... Have mercy on me in your great goodness, save me, you who are faithful. (Psalm 69:14).

Commentary

Matthew 7:1-5

Reading — (Genesis 13:2.5-18)

A reading from the Book of Genesis

Abram was very rich in cattle, in silver, and in gold. And Lot, who went with Abram, also flocks and herds and tents, so that the land could not support both of them dwelling together; possessions for their

were so great they could not dwell together, and there was strife between the herdsmen of Abram's cattle and the herdsmen of Lot's cattle. At that time the Canaanites and the Perizzites dwelt in the land. Then Abram said to Lot, "Let there be no strife between you and me, and between your herdsmen and my herdsmen; for we are kinsmen. Is not the whole land before you? Separate yourself from me. If you take the left hand, then I will go the right; or if you take the right hand, then I will go to the left." And lot lifted up his eyes, and saw that the Jordan valley was well watered everywhere like the garden of the Lord, like the land of Egypt, in the direction of Zoar: this was before the Lord destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah. First Reading -(Acts 12:1-11)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

In those days: Herod the king laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the Church. He killed

James the brother of John with the sword: and when he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. This was during the days of Unleavened Bread. And when he had seized him, he put him in prison, and delivered him to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending after the Passover to bring him out to the people. So Peter was kept in prison; but earnest prayer for him was made to God by the Church. The very night when Herod was about to bring him out, Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, bound with two chains, and sentries before the door were guarding the prison; and behold, an angel of the Lord appeared, and a light shone in the cell;

and he struck Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his hands. And the angel said to him, "Dress yourself and put on your sandals." And he did so. And he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." And he went out and followed him: he did not know that what was done by the angel was real, but thought he was seeing a vision. When they had passed the first and the second guard, they came to the iron gate leading into the city. It opened to them of its own accord, and they went out and passed on through one street; and immediately the angel left him. And Peter came to himself, and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has

sent his angel and rescued me from the hand of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting." The word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God**,
