'I Am not Ashamed of the Gospel'

In one of our readings this week, Saint Paul boldly said: "I am not ashamed of the Gospel, It is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes: for Jew first, and then Greek." (Rom 1:16-17) The English word 'ashamed' denotes a feeling of embarrassment or guilt deriving from one's actions, characteristics or associations. A person ashamed of his/her actions or associations feels a sense of remorse, regret and humiliation.

Like Saint Paul, we too are not ashamed of the gospel. We are not afraid to be identified with Jesus Christ for we believe in salvation that comes only from Him. We are not embarrassed when we look awkward because our actions are not in conformity with the thinking of the world (Rom 12:2) We are not afraid to defend our faith, rather we are always prepared to explain with gentleness to anyone who asks the reason of the hope we bear (1 Pt 4:15)

As we confess and profess Christ before men, we are convinced that he, in accordance with his promise, will also confess us before our heavenly Father (Mt 10:33)

The Concluding Rite

A fter the Communion rite, some brief announcements can be made to the people who are participating in the Holy Mass. The announcements must be done after the *Prayer after Communion*. It is not right to make them before the above prayer because they appear to be part of the Communion rite whereas they are part of the concluding rite according to the Order of Mass of the Roman Missal.

The Parish Priest and the Parish Council will make sure that announcements are meaningful to the Parishioners. In the same context, the introduction of some guests should be brief.

After the announcements, the main celebrant may remind the assembly about the major liturgical theme. It should be brief. Then comes the moment for the main celebrant to impart the final blessing on the assembly. On some occasions, the final blessing is preceded by a

solemn blessing which is in harmony with the event that is being celebrated.

The words that the priest uses to impart the final blessing are different from the words that are used by the bishop. When the final blessing is given by a priest: **Priest: The Lord be with you** Assembly: And with your spirit **Priest: May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.**

Assembly: Amen When the final blessing is given by a bishop: **Bishop: The Lord be with you** Assembly: And with your spirit **Bishop: Blessed be the name of the Lord** Assembly: Now and for ever Bishop: Our help is in the name of the Lord Assembly: Who made heaven and earth **Bishop: May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.** Assembly: Amen

Focus on the Holy Mass **Ť**

A priest makes the sign of the cross only once over the assembly whereas the bishop makes it three times. After the final blessing, the deacon or the priest pronounces one of the following sentences:

Go forth, the Mass is ended. Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord. Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life. Go in peace.

The assembly replies: Thanks be to God.

After this assembly's response, the celebrant kisses the Altar as at the beginning of the Holy Mass. And with the ministers (acolytes, readers, etc.) he makes a profound bow before withdrawing. At that moment, the choir sings the exit song.

Salvation: All-inclusive yet exclusive

In recent times, there has been strong debates as to the nature of salvation: is it all inclusive regardless or it is exclusive for certain categories of people? The offer of salvation is free. It is God who has saved us through Jesus without any effort from us. Everything has been done by God just as the banquet has been prepared by the king. And yet we know that every offer must either be accepted or rejected. This is the response of man. There are two dangers of the spiritual life; for some to think their effort is what justified the invitation and for others to think so far as everything has been prepared, they are saved regardless of what they do (whether they accept the invitation or not). In today's first and gospel reading we clearly see the work of God freely prepared for us and yet he requires us to respond to his invitation. Here, three categories of responses are seen: those who refuse, those who ignore and those who give excuses. Those who refuse are those who say a definite no to God; those who ignore are those who though have not said no to God categorically- they ignore his influence in their lives. Then we have the third group who give excuses and prefer to do other things than respond to God.



Yet another twist of the parable relates to us who believe in God and are Christians. We who if not the sacrifice of Christ where not part of the first invitees (Israel). The door has been widely opened for us. The danger is to think that because God wants everyone to be saved, it does not matter what you do. You would still be included. The man who comes in not properly dressed shows us that even though salvation is all inclusive, it requires a certain response to remain in the kingdom. The kingdom of God is both allinclusive and exclusive for those who do not respond to its requirement."


First Reading (Isaiah 25:6-10a) · A reading from the Book of Isaiah



Commentary

Luke 11: 29-32

Very often, we seek signs from God to feel His presence. But the absence of signs doesn't mean God is not present. Like finding a hospital without signage, signs make it easier to sense God, yet His reality remains. Today, God asks for a sign from us: repentance. In Jonah's time, God saw their efforts of repentance and relented. In this light, what Jesus invites us to with the reference to the sign of Jonah is the effort we ought to put in for people who claim to have repented.

fall short of the glory of God, they are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as an expiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins; it was to prove at the present time that he himself is righteous and that he justifies him who has faith in Iesus. Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. On what principle? On the principle of works? No, but on the principle of faith. For we hold that a man is justified by faith apart from works of law. Or is God the God of Jews only? Is he not the God of Gentiles also? Yes, of Gentiles also, since

God is one; and he will justify the circumcised on the ground of their faith and the uncircumcised through their faith.

Commentary

Romans 3: 21-30/ Ps 130: 1b-2. 3-4. 5-6ab

Saint Paul addresses a fundamental struggle since apostolic times between faith and works. He states clearly today that: "For we consider that a person is justified by faith apart from works of the law" (Rom 3:27). God's works are not based on the law, or else no one would be saved (cf. Psalm 130:3). Our salvation is solely based on God's righteousness and benevolence, not our own actions. We are saved through believing in God's act of salvation made possible by His grace.



Commentary

Faith Produces Works

Romans 4: 13. 16-18

Abraham's faith wasn't mere intellectual belief, but a living and tangible faith. He was willing to give up everything for the Lord. Although he didn't earn God's call through his actions, his response to the gift made him the father of many nations. Saint James' words, "Show me your faith without works, and I will show you my faith by my works," doesn't contradict Saint Paul. Both emphasize the primacy of faith, adds that this faith is not just an intellectual accent but one that produces fruits.
