

The Will of God

uring this liturgical week, we sang Psalm 40. A salient part of the psalm underlines our Christian calling: "Sacrifice and offering You did not desire, but my ears You have opened. ... Then I said, "Here I am, I have come— it is written about me in the scroll: I delight to do Your will, O my God ..." (Ps 40:6-8) Doing the will of God is the foundation of faith.

To do the will of God has two components: Firstly, it entails complete trust in the love and mercy of God. Thus, we pray in the Lord's prayer – 'thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven'. Allowing the will of God to be done in our lives shows our trustful belief that 'all things work together for the good of those who love God" (Rom 8:28) We therefore pray that God answers our prayers, not as we will, but as he wills (Mt 26:29). Doing the will of God, secondly, means doing good deeds which will be beneficial for us and for others. Our good deeds in turn merit us more blessings from God for we become like the dutiful and vigilant servants who were ministered to by their master in compensation for their diligence (Lk 12:35-38).

When we live daily with Christ, we will be enabled to abide by the will of God.

The Concluding Rite

A fter the Communion rite, some brief announcements can be made to the people who are participating in the Holy Mass. The announcements must be done after the *Prayer after Communion*. It is not right to make them before the above prayer because they appear to be part of the Communion rite whereas they are part of the concluding rite according to the Order of Mass of the Roman Missal.

The Parish Priest and the Parish Council will make sure that announcements are meaningful to the Parishioners. In the same context, the introduction of some guests should be brief.

After the announcements, the main celebrant may remind the assembly about the major liturgical theme. It should be brief. Then comes the moment for the main celebrant to impart the final blessing on the assembly. On some occasions, the final blessing is preceded by a

solemn blessing which is in harmony with the event that is being celebrated.

The words that the priest uses to impart the final blessing are different from the words that are used by the bishop. When the final blessing is given by a priest: **Priest: The Lord be with you** Assembly: And with your spirit **Priest: May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.**

Assembly: Amen When the final blessing is given by a bishop: **Bishop: The Lord be with you** Assembly: And with your spirit **Bishop: Blessed be the name of the Lord** Assembly: Now and for ever Bishop: Our help is in the name of the Lord Assembly: Who made heaven and earth **Bishop: May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit.** Assembly: Amen

A priest makes the sign of the cross only once over the assembly whereas the bishop makes it three times. After the final blessing, the deacon or the priest pronounces one of the following sentences:

Go forth, the Mass is ended. Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord. Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life. Go in peace.

The assembly replies: Thanks be to God.

After this assembly's response, the celebrant kisses the Altar as at the beginning of the Holy Mass. And with the ministers (acolytes, readers, etc.) he makes a profound bow before withdrawing. At that moment, the choir sings the exit song.

The Tax Belongs to Caesar but Caesar Belongs to God

L ast Sunday, Jesus described heaven as a banquet to which special guests were invited only for them to turn down the invitation at the last hour. While so many were making their way into God's kingdom, the Jewish religious leaders (the special guests), were looking for how to bring Jesus down by all means. They did not know that they were dealing with God before whom all human wisdom is dust. Jesus used the occasion to teach some important lessons:

1. Be careful when you see rivals working together. The Pharisees were against the payment of taxes because, for them, it was a sign of religious domination by the Romans. Meanwhile, the Herodians were entirely in support of the payment of taxes. If Jesus had simply answered either "Yes" or "No", he would have sparked off either religious sentiments among the Pharisees or civil action by the Herodians. This is the extent to which people are willing to go to pull us down, but in such moments as this, let us remember to call on God for Divine assistance.



2. Avoid persons who flatter you. By praising Jesus, they were hoping to get him in a relaxed mood so that he would speak without first thinking thoroughly. We must be cautious of those who praise us. "It is not all that glitters that is gold."

3. Worshipping God does not mean we should disrespect civil authorities. As Jesus puts it, "Render to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's," meaning that as long as we render to God the worship that is due to Him, it is not a sin to pay taxes. For Jesus, even though He had no business paying taxes as the Son of God, there was no need to offend. We learn from Jesus to obey civil authorities.

4. Even Caesar belongs to God. When we respect civil authorities, we are also giving respect to God by whose power these persons got into such positions. This is precisely the message contained in our first reading today. Isaiah describes Cyrus as God's anointed.

Luke 12:49-53

When a doctor tells us to avoid a particular type of food for our health, our love for that food dies, and we begin to see it as poison. In the same way, we must be able to tell ourselves that: "Sin is poison. Sin kills. Sin destroys." Jesus says in our Gospel passage that He has not come to bring peace on earth but rather division. 

Ephesians 2:19-22 / Ps. 19:2-5 / Luke 6:12-16

As we celebrate the Feast of apostles, Simon and Jude, our readings challenge us to reflect on the concept of our election and choice before God.
