

The church in Heaven and on Earth united

Every year on November 1st, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of All Saints. In this solemn celebration, the whole church, both in heaven and on the earth, is united. All of us are called to share in the holiness of God and to live holy lives on earth.

In the same month, the Church celebrates two other major Solemnities: the Solemnity of All Souls and Solemnity of Christ the King which marks the end of the liturgical year whereby the cycle of the Church's liturgical celebrations culminates in the beginning of the new liturgical year. The Solemnity of Christ the King is celebrated on the final Sunday of Ordinary Time. It is also the final Sunday of the liturgical year, the last Sunday before the First Sunday of Advent. This year, the Solemnity of Christ the King will be celebrated on November 20th. Sunday, November 27th will be the first Sunday of Advent and the beginning of the Liturgical Year A.

The Sacrament Of Penance

The sacrament of penance is also called sacrament of reconciliation. It was instituted by Jesus Christ. After his resurrection, he appeared to his disciples and gave them the power to remit sins as written in John 20, 23: «If you forgive anyone's sins, they will be forgiven. But if you don't forgive their sins, they will not be forgiven».

The sacrament of penance is one of the two sacraments of healing. Sin is a spiritual illness. Sin breaks two fundamental relationships: the relationship between God and the sinner; the relationship between the Church and the sinner. After confession, many people experience inner peace because they can definitely feel the relationship between them and God and they can participate fully in the Eucharist. Therefore, the sacrament of penance heals the penitent bringing them from darkness to Light.

The minister of the sacrament of reconciliation is the priest or the bishop. A deacon or any other minister

cannot hear confessions because they are not ordained to the priesthood. It is important to say that the penitent does not confess his sins to the priest, but to God represented by the priest. He is an instrument that God uses to convey his mercy to humankind. God is full of mercy and compassion for his children. He is ready to forgive them whenever they ask for forgiveness.

At the end of the sacrament of confession, the minister (priest or bishop) proposes a penance to the penitent. Penance is not punishment meant to humiliate the penitent. It is rather a prayer that the penitent recites to thank the Lord for his mercy and to ask for his grace. It can also be a work of mercy that the penitent is asked to perform during a certain period of time. The minister must be welcoming. His role is not to embarrass but to give hope by showing God's love to the penitent.

The sacrament of Penance is not to be confused with spiritual direction. A spiritual director helps a person or a couple or a family to grow in their human, Christian or religious life. But the sacrament of Penance has to do with the confession of sins. Nevertheless, spiritual direction can lead to confession and confession may lead

to spiritual direction. The sacrament requires human presence. One cannot confess their sins on phone or through social media.

According to the canon Law (can. 989), after having reached the age of discretion, each member of the faithful is obliged to confess faithfully their grave sins at least once a year. The matter of the sacrament of penance is contrition, confession, desire to amend life, and making of reparation by doing what the minister gives as penance. The form is made up of the following words pronounced by the minister: "...N, I absolve you of your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit".

In a general way, the sacrament of penance takes place in the confessional, a kind of box where the priest hears the confessions of the penitent. It can be administered elsewhere provided the place is fitting.

What Can I Learn from Zaccheus?

The gospel of today talks about the conversion of Zacchaeus, the man presented in the bible as short and rich. Despite his riches, he was never happy. Nobody wanted to befriend him. His town mates hated him because of working with and for the Romans. To them, Zacchaeus was a deceitful man and a traitor.

With Jesus, this chief tax collector, who was using his power and position in the government of his time to steal the money of his country, decided to take steps for a complete change in his life. He shows everyone that total conversion is possible. through his encounter with Jesus. He immediately decided to give half of his money to the poor and made restitution for the frauds of which he had been self-confessedly guilty. He does this because he finds in Jesus a new and wonderful friend. Just like some of us, Zacchaeus was probably thinking that being wealthy could give him security and happiness. When he meets Jesus, he finds in him the source of true happiness, and security. A



real friend indeed. He felt secure and satisfied when Jesus said he was to have lunch in his home. It was a privilege he had never had in his life.

Zacchaeus is happy to receive Jesus in his home. He promises in front of the public to change his life. He feels guilty about the injustices he had done to the people. How many times have we met Jesus? It could be be through the Holy Eucharist or other circumstances and have we been inspired to change our way of life? Do we feel guilty about our sins and confess them? There is a lot to learn from the story of Zacchaeus.




